





# Corfu moments

When designing her own home, Stefania Reynolds, head of interiors at Studio Johnston, drew on her heritage to create an inner-city haven.



ransforming a city-fringe apartment with deft spatial interventions and a Mediterranean palette, Maddison is a home awash with gentle tones, creative curves, unexpected sculptural interventions, and an overriding sense of calm. Home to Studio Johnston's head of interiors and project director, Stefania Reynolds, her husband, and their two young children, the project presented the perfect moment to really consider how they wanted to live in their home. Having spent COVID bundled together, new questions around what was important arose, such as where they are likely to gather and conversely, where they are happiest alone. It also made it clear that a home office, that was both connected and separate, was essential.


As a professional couple, opting for the convenient location of an apartment over the extra size, cost, or commuting time of a suburban family home made a lot of sense. Moreover, with Reynold's considerable talent (Studio Johnston is a highly regarded award-winning architecture and interiors practice specialising in residential and multiresidential), the couple were able to see the bones and potential of the large 1980s apartment in Redfern.

Generously scaled, with a private 68m2 courtyard directly accessed from the living room, the ground floor apartment was in a great location. Being close to schools, parks, transport, and recreational and cultural activities,

as well as the offices of both working parents, made it ideal for the whole family. That said, while the position was great and the existing three-bedroom layout was functional, the interiors were tired and lacked storage. Effectively, the whole apartment needed to 'work harder' and become more attuned to how the family interacted.

As the heart of the home and where the family naturally come together, the galley-style kitchen was not inducive to the kind of natural hub they needed. As such, Reynolds redesigned the space to close off the interior end, while opening the surrounding space by removing a column. In doing so, the design shifted significantly from a closed corridor to a relaxed and expanded space that melded naturally to the rest of the home. "Deleting that column in the kitchen opened everything up and unlocked the project," explains Reynolds. "It allowed us to organise the main space into seamless, overlapping zones, like a Venn diagram of how we actually occupy the home."

In reducing the scale of the utility portion of the kitchen, Reynolds wanted to carry the warmth of the kitchen through to the living area. As such, minimal shifts in materiality was essential, as were appliances that push the kitchen to work harder and leave the surfaces clear. Both the V-ZUG range hood and V-ZUG fully integrated dishwasher provide the high function needed without any overt visual presence. Conversely, the V-ZUG Combair oven with black mirror




glass and V-ZUG four zone induction cooktop were able to provide a wide range of functions while looking fabulous. "I chose V-ZUG appliances for my own renovation because I wanted timeless design, Swiss precision, and effortless performance in my home. Their quality and innovation made it an easy decision — I knew I was investing in something that would last," says Reynolds.

The newly formed dining and kitchen area is now oriented towards the courtyard and visually connected by wide oak floorboards, while eggshell Venetian plaster gives the kitchen ceiling and island bench a gentle glow that is picked up by brass trim. Tiberio marble and accent colours of silvery blue and pale gold bring Reynold's Greek heritage into play. "The interiors are inspired by the colours of my Corfu childhood. Peach was the colour of my bedroom. The family house had a lot of terracotta, textured walls, brass details, and had a light, airy feel. We had a huge day bed with cushions piled on top – this was my inspiration for the dining room. For me, nostalgia is a beautiful thing to bring into daily life."

These familial influences on her aesthetic and colour palette are beautifully realised by a custom table in crown-cut oak with colourful, mismatched legs, the larger of which has a strong horizontal stripe in a nod to the Memphis movement of the 1980s and the apartment's heritage. This is paired with a bespoke dining banquette in timber and Venetian plaster with saddle tan leather seating and mustard, corduroy velvet cushions. Warm and welcoming, the expanded kitchen is a delight, while the rearrangement of the spaces allows for a home office and ample storage to be woven into the design.

Curating a home is always personal, and for Reynolds, the use of architectural finishes, bespoke furniture, and textiles both elevate the interior and evoke her culture. The architectural joinery, for example, plays with radial curves and oblique angles to soften the apartment's blunt geometry, while the sliding glass doors to the courtyard are dressed by lush linen curtains in soft and deep tones of terracotta.

Beautiful, personal, and attuned to the family, Maddison is an inner-city home of absolute charm.

There is something lovely in things that are a little odd, a little eccentric, and just that tiny bit outside of the lines.

his is a philosophy taken up by award-winning Australian product designer Nicholas Johnston, with his imaginatively realised Eccentric Collection for Rogerseller.

Awarded both the Red Dot Award for Product Design and The Good Design Award Best in Class for Furniture & Lighting, The Eccentric Collection by Rogerseller is designed to disrupt. Offering a reinterpretation of traditional tapware, the collection is decidedly opposed to rigid uniformity. Instead, it adds richness and layers as it introduces expressions of individuality, warmth, and unexpected detail through its celebration of asymmetry and playfulness in the bathroom. "Eccentric is a nod to the unconventional thinker," Johnston says. "To the idea that balance can exist in asymmetry, and that refinement doesn't always follow the straightest line."

Johnston is himself an unconventional thinker, drawing on characters that flout convention. As such, the collection draws inspiration from the curious rituals of great thinkers and inventors — celebrating nonconformity, individuality, and the quiet rebellion against design convention. For this collection, Johnston pays homage to the quirky genius of the greatest minds in history, including Albert Einstein, Nikola

Tesla, and the Japanese inventor Yoshiro Nakamatsu, whose creative process involves listening to music before diving underwater to enjoy oxygen depriving deep dives, which he claims to spark his best ideas! For Johnston, the individualism, wonder, and curiosity found in many great scientists, explorers, and inventors, and their rebellion against convention, provides a cornucopia of creative impulse.

With this in mind, the unique positioning of the design is elegantly simple, with a slightly off-centre axis that challenges expectations and introduces a moment of surprise in an otherwise uniform space. This quirky characteristic, however, is subtle. The eccentric nature of the progressive tap mixer design (for both wall and hob), for example, is only revealed when the handle is turned and the unexpected back plate featuring cold and hot indicators is progressively revealed. Once the handle is returned to its closed position, the unconventional back plate is once again concealed.

Embracing the Japanese aesthetic philosophy of Wabisabi, which finds beauty in imperfection, the visual character of the Eccentric range, comprising cylindrical forms, minimalist lines, and an unexpected twist in orientation, present asymmetry as an imperfection to intrigue. In keeping with the Wabi-sabi appreciation of finding value in simple,



unadorned forms, the foundational shape of each of the pieces in the collection is that of an elegantly proportioned geometric cylinder. Inviting users to slow down and notice the details, the off-centre control is tactile and smoothly inviting to the hand.

The Robe Hook, perhaps the simplest of the designs, is first realised as a streamlined disk that sits out from the wall. However, in redefining the ritual of touch in the everyday, a simple twist of the hand brings the front plate upwards. In doing so, the design shifts from its simplest form to a more clearly expressed hook.

Designed for architects and homeowners, the Eccentric Collection is expansive, with options for every bathroom

need, from progressive mixers to wall basin sets, 2-way diverters, and shower roses. Accessory items within the range include the aforementioned Robe Hook, plus heated and unheated towel rails, paper holders, shelves, and more to ensure a consistent aesthetic throughout. Available in a range of finishes — including Chrome, Graphite, Brushed Nickel, Matte Black, and Brushed Gold — the collection provides specifiers with the freedom to contrast or complement. In short, a comprehensive solution for architectural bathrooms that lean into sculptural, expressive tapware. As Johnston states, the Eccentric Collection is "Designed to be noticed, not to blend in."
